

More than thirty years of my life have been spent serving young children and their families in Spartanburg County. During my career, I have worn many hats: 4K teacher, center director, board member, coach, trainer, adjunct professor, program director, and executive director of Spartanburg County First Steps. Since 2004, First Steps has been my work home, and I will miss it deeply when I retire in the spring of 2024. It has been my honor to work alongside an amazing leadership team, a committed staff, our dedicated board, and so many state and community partners. Our shared belief that the best world is a world where all young children have what they need to be successful in life is worth striving for. Thank you for including me in this impactful work.

Thank you, also, to Spartanburg County First Steps former Executive Director, Carolyn Brooks, for seeing something in me I couldn't see in myself when she named me the lead of the team that would eventually create and implement Quality Counts. As the founding director of Quality Counts, I never dreamed that 10 years later it would be named an evidenced-based strategy by SC First Steps, be implemented in other counties in SC, and win the 2020 Riley Institute WhatWorksSC award! I will always be grateful for the opportunity to have worked on Quality Counts from the very beginning and will continually be proud of its impact as it reaches further every year.

As I prepare to step down as Executive Director, I know Spartanburg County First Steps and our partners will continue to impact Spartanburg positively, despite the many challenges facing the world of early care and education. For the fifth consecutive year, First Steps partnered with The Children's Museum of the Upstate - Spartanburg for family engagement opportunities designed to reach our Early Head Start children and for the annual Countdown to Kindergarten Street Fair, which served more than 300 children this year. Quality Counts was chosen as a program partner in Spartanburg Academic Movement's Movement 2030 project, whose goal is to increase school readiness. The Franklin School was supported by a partnership with Hub City Farmer's Market to increase nutrition awareness and provide hands-on gardening experiences for 72 children. The Upstate Family Resource Center partnered with SCFS to grow their PASOS program in Spartanburg County. And last, but not least, all seven of our school districts partnered with us to provide almost 400 children with a summer learning experience in our Countdown to Kindergarten program. This good work is proof that we work best when we work together.

Thanks to you all, the young children of Spartanburg County will continue to be considered and championed. Their future is our future, and it is full of promise.


FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS



CHILDREN PREGNANT WOMEN

Less than 5% of eligible children in the county were served by the program.

Parent Involvement Activities Offered

Monthly trainings were offered that cover the following topics: family partnerships, transitions, family cultures, early childhood development, discipline, child nutrition, family literacy, child health, employment readiness, parent/adult education, family well-being risks, child, and family mental health, i.e. separation anxiety and attachment & financial literacy. Socialization activities and parent-child engagement events were held monthly.

Agency's Efforts to Prepare Children for Kindergarten

SCFS supports South Carolina First Steps 3K and 4K classrooms, there are MOAs with school districts and Head Start, the program participates in the preschool development grant (PDG), which is a longitudinal study to assess school readiness and success, the SCFS Quality Counts provides teacher trainings and technical assistance to the 0 to 5 teachers, centers and school districts and all children aging out of EHS have transition plans.
